The course is designed to equip students with A2 CEFR competency in Reading & Writing. The course provides instruction and practice on reading strategies like scanning, skimming, context clues, and summarizing. The writing section of the course attempts to develop writing accurate, concise, and well-connected paragraphs, and summaries. Concepts of writing processes like brainstorming, planning, drafting and revising are introduced and practiced.

2. Course Main Objective

- To employ micro and macro-reading skills for both fluency and accuracy.
- To plan and organize writing tasks through planning strategies such as T-charts, spider diagrams, paragraph planners and ideas maps.
- to produce short to medium-length single-paragraph descriptive and summary texts that are organized, concise, well-developed and relevant.
